Recently we celebrated the feast of Saints Peter and Paul.

Pope Francis noted in his homily that that these Apostles “stand before us as witnesses” and that “if we go to the heart of that testimony, we can see them as witnesses to life, witnesses to forgiveness and witnesses to Jesus”. Pope Francis underlined that the lives of these Saints “were not neat and linear.” “There

is a great teaching here”, he went on to say “The starting point of the Christian life is not our worthiness.”

“Whenever we consider ourselves smarter or better than others, that is the beginning of the end.” The Lord, the Pope continued, “does not work miracles with those who consider themselves righteous, but with those who know themselves to be need.”

Pope Francis pointed out that, throughout their lives, Peter and Paul practiced humility.

“Both understood that holiness does not consist in exalting but rather in humbling oneself”, he said. “Holiness is not a contest, but a question of entrusting our own poverty each day to the Lord, who does great things for those who are lowly.”

Posing the question, “What was the secret that made them persevere amid weakness? He answered by saying, “It was the Lord’s forgiveness.” In their failings, these Saints, he said, “encountered the powerful mercy of the Lord, who gave them rebirth. In his forgiveness, they encountered irrepressible peace and joy.” Peter and Paul stressed the Pope, “are ultimately witnesses to Jesus.”

“For those who are his witnesses, Jesus is more than a historical personage; he is a living person: he is newness, not things we have already seen, the newness of the future and not a memory from the past.” Jesus, remarked Pope Francis, “does not care about polls or past history. He is not looking for editors of religion, much less “front page” Christians. He is looking for witnesses who say to him each day: “Lord, you are my life.”

The Pope went on to explain that, “having met Jesus and experienced his forgiveness, the Apostles bore witness to him by living a new life: they no longer held back, but gave themselves over completely.” He also commented “Let us ask for the grace not to be lukewarm Christians living by half measures, allowing our love to grow cold ... Let us rediscover who we truly are through a daily relationship with Jesus and through the power of his forgiveness.” We can take so much personally from these inspiring words of wisdom from Pope Francis and reflect and act upon them.

As we begin a new Semester, I eagerly look to the Catholic Regional College Caroline Springs community to continue to foster and further develop the already strong relationships with the view to provide the best possible contemporary educational, spiritual and faith experience for our students.

Over the holiday period an enormous amount of work went into preparing facilities such as classrooms, IT facilities, sporting facilities and the College grounds for the students to utilise this Semester. I thank the teaching, administrative, support and maintenance staff involved in this important work as it contributes significantly to the comprehensive educational environment for our students.

Staff Professional Learning Day

Last Friday 250 staff from the Federation Colleges listen to a presentation by renowned theologian Dr. Carmody Grey. Dr. Carmody is Assistant Professor of Catholic Theology at the Centre for Catholic Studies, University of Durham.

Dr Grey has degrees in theology from Trinity College Oxford, King's College Cambridge and the University of Nottingham. She has completed her doctoral studies in theology at the University of Bristol, focusing on a theological account of life and nature.

Before starting her doctorate she was Head of Philosophy, Religion and Ethics at Bedales School in Hampshire, UK, as well as pursuing her ongoing interest in ecology and the life sciences through a postgraduate degree from Edinburgh. She has been involved in theological formation of priests, deacons and catechists, and is a columnist for "The Tablet", the highly regarded international Catholic weekly.

We were indeed honoured and privileged to spend the day together with Dr Carmody Grey as a Federation in dialogue and discussion with her. Throughout the day we covered the following topics:

God's Dream: The Gospel of Mercy

Pope Francis' pontificate has been driven by a singular vision. 'Mercy', he says, 'is the beating heart of the Gospel'. This conviction animates every single act of his pontificate. It is for him the only real 'identity card' of Christians. Indeed, it is the identity of Jesus Christ, who is 'the face of the Father's mercy'. 'Mercy' is what should make a Christian distinctive, recognisable; it is what should enable someone to say – *'That's a Christian'*.

For Francis, God does not measure our shortcomings. This is what the Church should be like. Not a body which finds fault and is proud of its own purity. It is a *'field hospital'*: a place for the broken, the lost, the 'unrighteous'. It is for the hopeless,

the excluded. Francis longs for a Church that is centrifugal; that is always going out to the peripheries. Indeed, for him, the peripheries are the place where Christianity becomes credible. This is what Pope Francis calls 'God's dream': God's dream of a world where no-one will feel alone.

Francis' vision has considerable implications for the way we live our identity as a Church: in the way we understand 'mission' (*Evangellii Gaudium*); the way we understand human love, sexuality, marriage and family life (*Amoris Laetitia*); and the way we understand Christian holiness – what Christians are called to be (*Gaudete et Exultate*).

Measuring 'Success'

Organisations in the modern world are driven by a notion of what constitutes 'success' for them. This is how they frame strategic direction for the future. Individuals too in our time often think of their lives in terms of 'success' or 'failure'. Our conceptions of 'success' reveal our deepest values, the worldviews which shape our lives but which too often we aren't fully aware of. Scrutinising these values and worldviews can help us to figure out what we really want – what really matters to us.

Catholic Social Teaching presents a conception of the meaning and goal of our lives that is often profoundly at odds with the way we are encouraged to think of success in the contemporary world. Pope Francis has criticised the modern 'technocratic paradigm', which leads us to think of every advance in scientific knowledge, material gain and technical capacity as equivalent to genuine human 'progress'. The Catholic vision, however, is that real 'progress' is always progress in relationship. For the purpose of human life is not endless increase in utility, but the joy of communion. Love is the only real measure of success.

Uganda Catholic Parish and Schools Immersion Experience

On Thursday 28 June, a group of staff and friends of the College departed for a two week immersion trip to southern Uganda.

The group included Deputy Principal Ric Broderick, Resurrection Parish Priest Fr Gerard Keith; teaching staff Karen Bailey (Year 8 YLL), Adam Ray, Sophie Martin, John Edwards, Georgia Seymour; alumni student Jesse Madigan and myself.

We were warmly welcomed into the Mannya parish by Fr Emmanuel (Emma) Kiwanuka Parish Priest at St Luke's Mannya, and the St Bernard's and St Nicholas Catholic school students. Our accommodation was in the parish guest quarters.

The trip involved visiting schools, working with local staff and students, outreach visits to other villages, medical centres and other community activities.

The main highlight of the immersion experience was spending three days at our sister school, St Francis Catholic Primary School Kizinga. You may remember that last year CRCCS launched the Uganda Project to initiate various infrastructure projects.

Currently St Francis has over 300 students, with classes being held outside and under trees as well as limited classes being held in a small church building with dirt floors. As a result of the generous support last year by the staff, students and the entire CRC community, we were able to successfully raise \$18,000. This money is now being used to build a two-classroom building, which is currently being constructed and is almost complete. It is also providing all students at the school with a healthy breakfast of porridge. During our visit we participated in a community Mass and formal welcoming ceremony, conducted lessons with the various classes and built strong relationships with the staff, students and families.

The photos below from our recent visit show the current progress of the new classroom block under construction as well as some beautiful video links of the St Francis students and CRCCS staff participating in various activities and the students participating in the food program. Everyone in our community sponsored both of these programs through the \$18,000 donated last year. Stage 2 of the project will be launched at a whole school assembly early this term and it is hoped that water tanks and a dam can be installed, a lunch program introduced, classroom furniture purchased, the church floor concreted as well as the purchase of some adjacent land for cropping and a sustainable food source.



Living the Gospel

CRC Federation Faith Day - Dr Carmody Grey

On Monday 15 July staff from the CRC Federation had the privilege of listening to Dr Carmody Grey- Assistant Professor of Catholic Theology at the Centre for Catholic Studies, University of Durham, UK

Dr Grey reflected on two themes 'Measuring Success' and 'God's dream the Gospel of Mercy'. Throughout the day staff had the opportunity to dialogue the many concepts discussed within the sessions. Some key insights of the day for us as educators included:

- The importance of allowing our students to take the time to step back and reflect about things in our lives
- Questioning our students to reflect on 'what they worship?' Worshiping discipline, sacrifice, truth and beauty as opposed to money, sex, power, intellect, profit, social media.
- The importance of developing students in virtue.
- Reminding our students that God is love and that love is the ultimate measure of success.
- Creating a sense of gratitude amongst our students
- The need to encounter and accompany people within the peripheries of our society. The poor, the marginalized, the suffering. 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me' (Matthew 25:45)

Feast of the Assumption Mass – 15 August

The 15 August commemorates the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary - the belief that because Mary was sinless her soul and incorrupt body was assumed into heaven.

Throughout each year, we pause to listen to our students, families and staff to gauge how our learning community is travelling. This feedback is invaluable to our progress as an effective school community.


One of the more important formal ways we engage and gather data is through **CEMSIS**, the Catholic Education Melbourne School Improvement Surveys.

STEM with NASA International Experience 2019

On Friday 21 June, 21 Year 10 students traveled to Orlando, USA to participate in the STEM with NASA International Experience. Students participated in a variety of STEM workshops at the Kennedy Space Centre, iFly, Universal Studios and Disney World. Two student reflections of the trip are below:

The STEM with NASA experience is one to truly remember. I speak on behalf of most people when I say that witnessing a rocket launch was by far the highlight of the trip. We were able to put studies and theories that we had learnt from participating in the programs available at Kennedy Space Centre into practise and solidify our understandings. Visiting Kennedy and exploring NASA in depth was the highlight of the experience for me. Being someone that enjoys learning about NASA and Space as a whole, having the opportunity to look at and learn about spacecraft and equipment that had been used in previous missions is just purely amazing. Taking part in the programs at Universal Studios and Disney World has changed the way I view a rollercoaster for the better. We looked into the engineering and physics that need to take place before a ride is even considered. Kinetic and potential energy, with the help of gravity, are the only reasons that rollercoasters exist. These new learnings have opened up new avenues in a potential future career that I would have never of thought of considering. From the 21 June to the 3 July, 21 year 10 students travelled to the Orlando, Florida to participate in the STEM with NASA International Experience. During the first three days of our trip we went to Kennedy Space Centre where we all contributed and participated in many programs that NASA had planned for us. We got to experience the Astronaut Training Experience Program and the Mars Base One Program. During these programs we got to learn and experience many things such as taking part in a virtual reality program, Mars Rover simulators and also microgravity workshops. We had the opportunity to talk with the people who work at NASA and hear some of the amazing things that they do at NASA everyday. We also had a guided tour of the Kennedy Space Centre where we got to see the space shuttle Atlantis and the rocket Saturn V.
